2026 BUDGET MESSAGE

Date: December 15, 2025

Honorable Commissioners:

I am pleased to submit a balanced, fiscally conservative proposed budget for **FY2026** for the Bayou Cane Fire Protection District for your review, comment, and action. The proposed **2026** budget is **\$10,108,981.46**. This represents a **\$1,160,851.16** increase, **13%** from the **2025** adopted budget of **\$8,948,130.30**.

The FY 2026 budget has been developed with a focus on fiscal responsibility, operational readiness, and continued service excellence. It reflects projected growth in ad valorem taxes and EMS revenue, balanced against rising personnel, benefits, equipment, apparatus, and insurance costs. Strategic investments are directed toward facility improvements, training programs, and apparatus reliability.

The District remains committed to maintaining its PIAL Class 2 Public Protection Grading and ensuring that residents and businesses receive the highest level of fire and emergency medical services.

RESPONSIBILITIES

The Bayou Cane Fire Protection District proudly serves the citizens of central Terrebonne Parish with a longstanding commitment to excellence. With a Public Protection Grading of "**Class 2**", we continuously strive to uphold the highest community involvement and customer service standards.

Beyond traditional fire protection, we provide on-scene emergency medical care through our team of Nationally Registered Paramedics and Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs). Since November 1, 2023, we have expanded our Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Division to include **Advanced Life Support (ALS) transport** capabilities. Each apparatus is equipped with Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) and other vital medical equipment, staffed by medically certified personnel. This expansion has proven to be a lifesaving enhancement for our community and the broader Terrebonne Parish.

TEAM AND LEADERSHIP

The continued success of the Bayou Cane Fire Protection District is a direct result of the leadership and guidance provided by our Fire District Board of Commissioners. The strong working relationship between the Board and the Department is a key element in achieving our goals.

Over the years, our department has cultivated a unified team with a shared sense of pride and professionalism. This accomplishment has been realized through aggressive training programs, administrative coaching, and positive reinforcement. Our team's dedication reflects a professional image that both the Board and our community can take pride in.

Budget Details

REVENUE:

- The Ad Valorem revenue estimate is projected to **increase by 1.1% or \$64,502** for FY 2026.
- All other revenue sources are projected to remain relatively the same; however, we are estimating **\$1,350,000 in EMS revenue.**
- Total revenue estimate is projected to increase by **1.9% or \$149,295** for FY 2026.

EXPENDITURES:

- Overall, the District's Budget Expenditures are estimated to increase by **\$1,160,851 or 13%.**
- The new Engine Pumper is included at a cost of **\$931,049.39**
- The motor replacement on Truck 44 was an increase to the vehicle repairs.
- Employee benefits, health insurance specifically, have increased by **14%.**
- Auto insurance has increased from **\$382,498** in **2025** to **\$510,672** in **2026 (33.5% increase.)**
- Property, general liability, and umbrella policies have increased from **\$186,545** in 2025 to **\$285,089** in **2026 (52.8% increase).**

Executive Summary

The Bayou Cane Fire Protection District achieved significant progress throughout 2025, marking a year of advancement in training, safety, infrastructure, and operational readiness. The department successfully completed a full Recruit Academy, with a second academy scheduled to graduate in February 2026, ensuring a continuous influx of trained personnel. Members received critical Search and Rescue instruction tailored to both natural and man-made disasters, while all staff were trained in Active Shooter Response. In addition, advanced Tactical Casualty and Combat Care courses were completed by medical personnel, and body armor was issued department-wide, emphasizing responder safety in high-risk environments.

Major infrastructure milestones were also reached with the completion of the Burn Building and Flashover Building, both funded through State support. These facilities substantially enhance the department's ability to conduct realistic, high-value training. Administratively, the department finalized a comprehensive policy revision and transitioned all documents to secure digital storage. Personnel continued to represent Bayou Cane at local, state, and national levels through their service on various professional committees.

Looking ahead to 2026, the department is focused on integrating new technology and innovative techniques into fire and EMS operations to improve service delivery. Planning will begin for expanding Search and Rescue capabilities—specifically water and boat operations—aligned with the development of the Savanne Road Recreation Area. The department will continue working closely with parish leaders to ensure proper emergency management planning in the new wildlife and recreation zone. Additional goals include strengthening Rescue Task Force capabilities for active shooter incidents and expanding hazardous materials response capabilities in partnership with Houma Fire. These initiatives collectively position Bayou Cane Fire Protection District for continued growth and enhanced community protection.
